So, WAALI was created out of a conversation with the governor at the time – Her Excellency Kerry Sanderson – and it was a discussion around mentoring Aboriginal women and there's a real need in the community to have our women mentored.

Instead of a mentoring program, I actually said to Kerry – think bigger picture, think why can't we develop a leadership program for our Aboriginal women that will really give them the tips and the tools and the things that they need to be great leaders in whatever community they come from.
